MINUTES

Update Report

Dr. Calhoun participated in a conference call with the Napa Group and the other task force chairs, updating everyone on the progress of the Health Sciences Task Force. He updated the group on the process utilized, synopsis of the two meetings to date, along with the following emerging themes:

- Interprofessional Education - Interprofessional Practice
 - Academic Health Sciences currently has a great start and commitment
 - Need to make it real
 - Needs to be team-based practice
 - Not all disciplines are currently in Academic Health Science Center. Example – Behavioral Health
 - Focus on the “New Students” (workplace skills)
 - Education needs to be tied to outcome and not on a calendar.
 - Clinical practice model (common medical record, building in each city with all disciplines, team-based practice, data driven)
- New Programs
 - Dentistry
 - Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist Program
 - Dual Degrees
 - PhD in Rehabilitative Sciences
 - Physician’s Assistant Program
 - Health Informatics Technology



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- Infrastructure/Facilities/Space
 - Academic Health Sciences Center - one campus
 - Interprofessional Education – Center – Leadership - Physical presence
- Research
 - Translational research focus
 - Research identity needed
 - Barriers need to be broken down
 - Basic science/clinical sciences - more collaborative

Assumptions

- Technology
- Interprofessional education
- Quality
- Traditional academic business model won't work (competition/market)

Dr. Calhoun reported on the “early wins”.

- No one holding on to the present
- No silos (turf battles)
- All engaged
- No one challenging “big ideas”
- Ready for convergence
