Presenters' Bios

Bennett, Savannah

Savannah Bennett is a graduate student pursuing a Master of Arts in Appalachian Studies and a certificate in Heritage Interpretation and Museum Studies at East Tennessee State University. As a scholar, Savannah is passionate about studying the roles of women throughout Appalachian history and the intersections between Appalachian music and western art music. She served as graduate assistant at ETSU's Reece Museum and hopes to continue her journey as an emerging collections-oriented museum employee in the professional sector.

Campbell, Liam

Dr. Liam Campbell is Director of the Mellon Centre for Migration Studies based at the Ulster American Folk Park. He has published and lectured widely on heritage and environmental issues, especially about the Northwest of Ireland. He held the Basler Chair of Excellence for Integration of the Arts, Rhetoric, and Science at East Tennessee State University in 2018.

Corr, Séan

A native of County Monaghan, Seán holds a Masters in Library & Information Management from Ulster University. After over ten years working in public libraries for Libraries NI, Seán took up a new role last August with the Linen Hall Library, Belfast. Seán is Honorary Secretary of Clogher Historical Society.

Corry, Liam

Liam Corry has worked at the Ulster American Folk Park, (National Museums Northern Ireland) for many years as a curator. His interests mainly reflect the activities of the museum, agriculture, social history on both sides of the Atlantic, migration history and new migration to Ireland.

Dahmer, Adam

Adam Dahmer is a PhD candidate in Celtic and Scottish Studies at the University of Edinburgh, and an adjunct professor of Scottish Gaelic at East Tennessee State University. He spends his time between Calgary, Alberta and his native Louisville, Kentucky, where he and his wife, Dhanya Baird, promote Scottish Gaelic speech, literacy, and music under the auspices of their organization, SPLANG!.

Fitzgerald, Patrick

Dr Paddy Fitzgerald is Head of Research and Development at the Mellon Centre for Migration Studies at the Ulster American Folk Park, Omagh. He completed his PhD. on 'Poverty and Vagrancy in Early Modern Ireland' at Queen's University Belfast in 1994 and is co-author of *Migration in Irish History*, *1607-2007* (Palgrave, 2008) with Dr Brian Lambkin.

Gardiner, Pauline

Dr. Gardiner is a native of Londonderry with deep familial roots in the Lagan Valley of County Donegal. She holds a BA Hons in Irish History and Politics, MRes in Early Modern History and a PhD in Modern Irish Social History. Her research interests lie in identity and belonging; commemoration; and the experience of Great War veterans in Ireland.

Gibson, Hannah

Hannah Gibson has completed a BMus (hons) at City University of London, an MA in Social Anthropology from Queen's University, Belfast, and was rewarded her PhD in Ethnomusicology in November 2021 from Queen's University, Belfast. Her PhD thesis entitled *Cultural intimacies of Irish Country music: dancing, performance, and aesthetics* examines live music events, participation in the scene through dance, musical professionalism and gendered labour, and the aesthetics and media strategies of Irish Country music. She is

interested in working further on analysing the representation of masculinities in Irish Country music. She now works as a guide at the Ulster American Folk Park, Omagh, as a lecturer/teaching assistant at Queen's University Belfast, and as a private music tutor of viola and violin. Outside work she enjoys cycling and cooking.

Gilmour, John

John Gilmour is probably best known for his involvement in the Ulster American Folk Park. In 1976, when the Park first opened, he was seconded from teaching as its first Education Officer and in 1992 was appointed Director. In this role he led an ambitious programme of capital development and visitor expansion, which resulted in the museum becoming one of the leading tourist attractions and educational resources in Northern Ireland. In 1998, he was instrumental in negotiating the merger of the Folk Park with the Ulster Museum and the Ulster Folk and Transport Museum to form the National Museums of Northern Ireland. From 1992 until his retirement, John was Director of capital projects across the three National Museums, the most ambitious of which was the multi - million-pound refurbishment of the Ulster Museum in Belfast. This project won numerous awards, including the prestigious UK Art Fund Prize, awarded in 2010 for its innovative new exhibition galleries. Today he is Chairman of the Scotch Irish Trust of Ulster and the Mellon Centre for Migration Studies which he founded in 1996, to provide a research and teaching focus for the Folk Park.

Guy, Meg

Meg Guy served Tennessee State Parks first as Park Ranger then Manager of Roan Mountain State Park. Now she supports 18 parks across East Tennessee as Regional Interpretive Specialist. Meg holds a B.S. in Plant & Soil Sciences from the University of Tennessee and an M.A. in Appalachian Studies from ETSU.

Honeycutt, Scott

Scott Honeycutt is an associate professor of English at East Tennessee State University. His research interests include nineteenth century American literature, nature writing, poetry, and young adult literature. When not teaching, Scott enjoys spending time with family and walking the hills of Appalachia.

An award-winning Scottish fiddler and classical violinist, Jane also teaches in the department's renowned Bluegrass, Old-Time, and Roots Music Studies program.

Michelle 'Chelle' McIntyre-Brewer is a graduate of University of Nebraska Omaha, with a Master's degree in Critical and Creative Thinking with dual concentrations in Cultural and Global Analysis and International Migration, Development, and Citizenship, as well as a minor in Native American Studies. She attended the University of Ulster Coleraine focusing on Irish Heritage and Culture and is currently cultural liaison for the decolonization of National Museums Northern Ireland.

Mullan, Fintan

Fintan Mullan has been Executive Director of Ulster Historical Foundation since 2001. He has extensive experience in Irish family history research and publishing, hosting genealogy conferences, courses and events, and is a regular international speaker on Irish genealogy.

Rebecca Proffitt (Director, Reece Museum) is a folklorist and an award-winning educator and curator with more than two decades of experience in teaching and researching expressive culture. She began focusing on Arts Integration through work with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC, and then returned to ETSU to earn an MA for Appalachian Studies in 2017.

Roach, Ron

Ron Roach is Professor and Chair of Appalachian Studies at East Tennessee State University and director of the Center of Excellence for Appalachian Studies and Services. He has engaged in comparative mountain studies in the Carpathian Mountains of Ukraine and Romania and served as an instructor in ETSU's study abroad program in Ireland and Scotland.

Stokes, Ashli

Ashli Quesinberry Stokes (Ph.D., University of Georgia) is Professor of Communication Studies at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.
