## Notes from the Chair

When we inaugurated this Dept. of Philosophy & Humanities newsletter at the end of 2019, we had no idea of what the next couple of years had in store for us all. But we have weathered it, and we hope you have done the same.

After our classes shifted abruptly online in March 2020, we stayed with remote instruction through the 2020-21 academic year. The faculty negotiated this transition in characteristic fashion by rolling up their sleeves and figuring out how to make it work. We learned new technologies for running synchronous classes and for recording and editing lectures for asynchronous ones; we attended training sessions and workshops on pedagogical techniques and assessments for online courses; we shared resources and tips with colleagues both at ETSU and elsewhere – all with one goal in mind – to keep teaching our classes effectively and to be there for our students. We returned to primarily face-to-face instruction in 2021-22, and though this has not exactly been a return to 'normal,' we have adapted to the challenges.

The last two years have also brought some important changes among the faculty. Dr. Jeff Gold retired after 42 years with the university, and Dr. Ian Hensley joined the department as our specialist in ancient philosophy. And though the pandemic stopped faculty travel to conferences, it didn't prevent the faculty from continuing with their research and scholarly activity – most notably, Dr. Hensley was a fellow at the Centre for Hellenistic Studies in Spring 2021, and in 2022, Dr. Michael Allen published a co-edited volume and won the College of Arts & Sciences Faculty Research Award.

Our students have proved to be resilient and continue to excel, with some presenting work at undergraduate conferences. To support students as they approach their final year in the program, the faculty established the Philosophy Senior Scholarship in 2021. We are pleased to hear of the success of recent graduates as they pursue graduate and professional degrees at other institutions. All of the faculty enjoy hearing from alumni and former students, so please keep in touch and let us know what you have been up to.

#### **Department Welcomes New Assistant Professor, Ian Hensley**

In fall of 2020, the Department of Philosophy & Humanities was pleased to welcome Dr. Ian Hensley to the faculty as Assistant Professor. Specializing in ancient Greek and Roman philosophy, Dr. Hensley received his doctorate from Cornell University in 2016 and taught at Emory & Henry College and University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. During spring of 2021, he was a Research Fellow at Harvard University's Center for Hellenic Studies.

Originally from rural southwest Virginia, Dr. Hensley graduated with honors from University of Virginia before going on to study at Cornell University, where he was awarded the Margaret Werly Graduate Fellowship and the Sage Fellowship.

Since 2020, Ian has published several articles, book chapters, and book reviews. He has also given talks at Oxford University's Ancient Philosophy Workshop, the Pacific Division Meeting of the American Philosophical Association, and will give a talk at the Symposium Hellenisticum in Geneva, Switzerland this summer.

### Jeff Gold Retires from Philosophy Department After Forty-Two Years of Service


In 2020, the Philosophy Department bid farewell to Jeffrey Gold, who retired after 42 years of dedicated service to the institution. During that period, Dr. Gold touched the lives of thousands of ETSU students in his roles as professor, advisor, and administrator.

Jeff Gold came to ETSU in 1978 after receiving his Ph.D. from the Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio. He was department chair from 1981 to 1987 and again from 2004 to 2010.

Dr. Gold was a popular and well-liked professor, and many students at ETSU were introduced to philosophy in his courses. Specializing in ancient philosophy, Dr. Gold also taught classes in Eastern philosophy and mysticism, covering topics such as yoga and Kabbalah, Theories of Liberation, and Buddhism.

Dr. Gold served as an advisor throughout his teaching career, advising Philosophy majors and honors students in the department, as well as undeclared students in the University Advisement Center. He was also the director for the Center for Undeclared Majors from 1993 to 1998 while serving as associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

#### Dr. Michael Allen's Distinguished Research

In Spring of 2022, Dr. Michael Allen was honored with the College of Arts and Sciences Distinguished Research Award. Along with this award, Dr. Allen wrote the *book Rethinking the American Animal Rights Movement* with Emily Patterson-Kane and Jennifer Edie, and it was published by Routledge Press in 2022.

Since 2020, Dr. Allen has contributed 13 published journal articles, including five single-authored and eight co-authored pieces. He continues his dedication to both educating his students and pursuing his valuable research.
