This year's ceremony was held in the East Tennessee Room in the Culp Center, where Melissa and Dottie received their awards and each shared stories about their lives, accomplishments, hurdles they overcame, and commitment to their respective fields.

Melissa Shafer started us off, regaling us with tales of growing up with pilots for parents. She flew a plane before she got her drivers license! Shafer is a professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance at ETSU and teaches courses in Design and Production. The night of the ceremony was also the opening night of the production she directed this semester, "Cabaret." When asked what her favorite play is, she answered, "It's always the one I'm working on!" Her colleagues commented on her commitment to mentorship and continually going the extra mile for her students, staff, and colleagues.

Dr. Dottie Greene is an Associate Professor in the Department of Social Work and the Executive Director of the Johnson City Recovery Center (JCRC). Greene has begun to transform our region with peer support access for addiction, and reducing stigma associated with substance use disorders. She has nearly 40 years working in the field of addiction. Though her work is hard, her passion for it can light up any room, even when in a dinosaur costume (she likes to dress up for Halloween). The audience learned of her personal growth, commitment to training students, and impact in the community.

BOOK CLUB

"SIDE AFFECTS: ON BEING TRANS AND FEELING BAD"

Hosted by WGSS, Dr. Mickey White led a book club to encourage thoughtful conversation, reflection, and deeper understanding of the trans experience, for transgender and cisgender persons alike. Dr. White explains that attendees made connections to their own experiences and increased compassion and understanding for the trans folk in their lives.

The book's author, Dr. Hil Malantino, is an Associate Professor of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies & Philosophy at Penn State. He is also the Acting Director & Senior Research Associate for the Rock Ethics Institute. Hil served as former Assistant Director & lecturer for our very own WGSS Program. His aim has been to open new conversations about trans experiences, acknowledging and centering unloved feelings.

"I think the book club was a positive experience, and it sparked some excellent conversation around challenging the current narratives of trans experience as either a euphoric journey to authenticity that heals all wounds or an escape from dysphoria and a future of discrimination. We were able to talk about the nuance of trans experiences through the lenses of emotions often left on the margins: fatigue, rage, envy, burnout, and numbness; followed by what 'real' self-care may mean for trans people."


Student Event Feature
