STUDENTS SEARCHING FOR A C.U.R.E: TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION OF SCIENTISTS IN WOMEN'S HEART HEALTH

# WGSS 2020: WOMEN IN GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE

## (New Compass Core Course)

While the Women in Global Perspective course is not new, being a Compass Core Course is and Pat Buck (professor) is always bringing fresh and innovative ways to engage with the material. This semester, Pat had the students present on Non Governmental Organizations (NGO's) in the multicultural center, open to the faculty, staff, and students of ETSU.

Here is what Pat has to say about the course and impact of this assignment and course: "We start with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and use that as a framework for studying many of the same topics that show up in our WGSS intro class; gender socialization, family, reproduction, sexuality, work, politics and leadership. We also look at the global economy and issue of development and sustainability. One of the course themes is that women are not passive--They have agency to create change, they work in many ways to influence their private lives and public status. That's why one of the main assignments in the course is to research NGO's which serve and advocate for women."



All presentations for this course are available on our website. The students got to use Microsoft sway, a operating system provided by ETSU through Microsoft. Dr. Williams stated, "It made the presentations very impactful".



# THE BODY IS NOT AN APOLOGY

In Spring 2025, we decided to have a book discussion about The Body is Not an Apology by Sonya Renee Taylor, in honor of Women's History Month. Dr. Williams has wanted to focus on embodiment, and this book helps readers understand the world around them, as well as the political nature of bodies. Taylor provides readers with tools and insights to navigate a world that often marginalizes those who do not fit conventional beauty standards, emphasizing the importance of challenging systems that perpetuate inequality and fostering a global movement toward compassion and iustice.

WGSS partnered with WGRC and the Multicultural Center to make the book discussion more accessible to those who wanted to join. WGRC & Multicultural Center provided free books to those who wanted to participate. This is the second embodiment event that WGRC & WGSS have partnered on, the first being the "PCOS Stories" Panel.

"Although we had folks in the group who had never met each other before, by coming together around this issue that we have all been impacted by in some way, we almost immediately formed a supportive space where each was able to share vulnerable thoughts and experiences, form connections, and feel less isolated in the struggles of our lives. I was able to leave with insights gathered from each group member who had shared a unique perspective or put words to a common experience we had been unaware of or unable to define." - Attendee

# Period Product Donation and Giveaway!



In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, WGSS, WGRC, and The Pride Center were awarded a donation of surplus menstrual hygiene products. The organizing team at the NE TN disaster relief center housed at Bristol Motor Speedway reached out to ETSU through the Student Government Association to gauge willingness of campus departments and organizations to help distribute the overwhelming donation of menstrual products received. Through a partnership with the Department of Sustainability and the Logistics team at Goodwill of Tenneva, five pallets of products were procured from the Bristol Motor Speedway to be distributed by WGSS, the WGRC, the Pride Center, and RISE: Healthy for Life on campus and in the larger Johnson City community. WGSS received a Donation of 5,552 menstrual pads, all counted and inventoried by Sierra Tenney, one of our FWS students. We make it part of our mission to supply the bathrooms in our building as well as host events dedicated to product distribution to students. We love contributing this positive impact on campus.


