Center for Community College Leadership

The Center for Community College Leadership at East Tennessee State University was created in 2016 with a mission to bring perspective to the complex issues faced by community colleges. With the graduate Certificate in Community College Leadership, the Center provides knowledge, training, and practical experience in dealing with legal, financial, policy, and administrative issues that are central to the community college environment.

Graduates of the certificate program have been promoted to roles as community college presidents, vice presidents, deans, and directors. The current cohort of professionals with leadership potential and established leaders who have honed their leadership skills will graduate in summer 2019.

First Spring 2019 Weekend Seminar Held at Volunteer State Community College

The Center for Community College Leadership hosted its first spring weekend seminar at Volunteer State Community College on January 25-26 for students in the Certificate in Community College Leadership program. The speaker for the Friday evening session was Dr. Kenyatta Lovett who serves as the Executive Director of Complete Tennessee. He is responsible for developing and executing the strategic vision to augment Tennessee's goal to significantly increase postsecondary attainment by 2025. He also leads Complete Tennessee's research initiatives to better inform higher education policy and practice in Tennessee.

The guest lecturer in the Saturday session was Dr. Heidi Leming, who serves as the Vice Chancellor for Student Success at the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR). Dr. Leming also led discussions related to student services and student success initiatives. She discussed her work with student affairs operations at technical colleges and community colleges and her System-level advocacy to other state agencies and the legislature on student related issues. During her tenure at TBR, she has been instrumental in advancing student affairs and student success initiatives related to accessibility, high impact practices, Title IX, academic mindset and support for low-income and minority student populations. In addition to her work at TBR, Dr. Leming serves on the Volunteer Tennessee Board and currently serves as the National Association for Student Personnel's (NASPA) Southern Region Public Policy Director.

Channing, Students Present at Conference

Dr. Jill Channing and Community College Certificate students Weston Dulaney and Sinthea Reynolds recently attended the League for Innovation in the Community College Conference in New York and presented their paper, "Tennessee's Innovative State-wide Community College Initiatives," to Community College faculty, staff, and administrators from across the nation and from other nations.

Channing, Dulaney, and Reynolds led a discussion and interactive session on Tennessee's community college initiatives. Reynolds, Bursar at Cleveland State Community College, and Dulaney, biology professor at Columbia State Community College, provided examples and shared first-hand knowledge from their own institutions as they showed how community colleges throughout the state were using research and high impact practices to increase credit hour completion, graduation rates, and access to higher education. The team also

suggested how Tennessee's cutting-edge state-wide community college initiatives could be improved, especially in terms of ensuring educational equity by developing additional programs to support students who are minorities and students who come from low-socioeconomic backgrounds.

While in New York, the team visited researchers at Columbia

University Teacher's College's Community College Research Center to discuss their research and explore possible future collaborations.

Dr. Channing also presented three additional sessions at the conference on "Increasing Enrollment in Online Community College Programs," "Reaching and Recruiting Adult Students," and "Challenges and Opportunities for Community Colleges in the Coming Decade."
