(A) Policy Statement:

The Gold Foundation sponsors the annual Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Awards for a graduating student and faculty member at over 85 of the nation's medical schools. This award is presented to the student and faculty member who best demonstrate the Foundation's ideals of outstanding compassion in the delivery of care, respect for patients, their families, and healthcare colleagues, as well as demonstrated clinical excellence.

(B) Purpose of Policy:

The Gold Foundation began this award in 1991 at Columbia University College of Physicians & Surgeons. The Healthcare Foundation of New Jersey began replicating these awards nationwide in 1998, with participation from The Gold Foundation. In 2003, with a generous donation from Leonard Tow, these awards became solely sponsored and administered by The Gold Foundation. Medical schools wishing to bestow this pair of awards should abide by the criteria set forth in their selection process.

(D) Policy Activities:

Medical Students

The initial call to the class for nominations will be made by the Office of Student Affairs at the beginning of February with the final selection occurring by mid-March. The Financial Aid & Scholarship Committee will review the submitted nominations and select the most deserving graduating student to receive the award.

- Displays competence in scientific endeavors

Faculty Members

- Sensitive to the patients' psychological well-being
- Effectively identifies emotional concerns of patients and family members
- Cooperative, respectful and easy to work with engenders trust and confidence
- Adheres to professional and ethical standards
- Committed to reflection and objective self-evaluation of his/her skills
- Displays competence in scientific endeavors
