

UNIT REPORTS

Arts & Sciences

- The college recently hosted the kick-off of an Art Cinema in the Bud Frank Theatre - the only art cinema in the region outside of Asheville.
- Dozens of faculty, alumni, and students represented ETSU at the 2023 International Bluegrass Music Association World of Bluegrass Conference in Raleigh, North Carolina.
- The ETSU Majorettes and Color Guard have been invited to perform in the Radio City Music Hall Christmas Spectacular on November 27, 2024.

Business & Technology

- The college launched a new Hospitality and Tourism Concentration which offers numerous career opportunities such as hotel and resort management, destination marketing, and more.
- Forty-three students have been accepted into the 2023-24 CBAT Andrew Leadership Academy. This third cohort consists of 30 senior undergraduate and 13 graduate students from all major disciplines of study within the College of Business and Technology.
- CBAT recently inducted new Hall of Fame members: Robert Anderson (Horizon Award), Richard Manahan (Faculty Lifetime Achievement), B.J. King (Lifetime Achievement Award), and Morris Baker (Lifetime Achievement.

Clemmer College of Education & Human Development

- The ETSU Board of Trustees recently approved a new name for the college: the Clemmer College of Education and Human Development.
- Clemmer's own Dr. Dawn Rowe received the Distinguished Faculty Award in Research, the highest honor bestowed to an ETSU faculty member.
- Associate Dean Dr. Pam Mims was named co-investigator of a \$3.4 million research project funded by BioMADE.

Quillen College of Medicine

- The Quillen College welcomed 78 members of the Class of 2027; this incoming class includes five veterans.
- Faculty member Dr. Aaron Polichnowski was awarded a \$601,000 grant from NIH to research a possible link between blood vessel function and hypertension.
- The Quillen College of Medicine made a significant jump in this year's U.S. News & World Report ranking of "Medical Schools: Primary Care," moving from 65 in 2022 to 38 this year.
