- Campaign Update: We are currently at \$140.4M, far exceeding our goal of \$120M! However, we still need help in the areas of Faculty and Facility Support. For updates and more information, visit www.etsu.edu/give.
- **ETSU Day of Giving:** Kudos to Annual Giving, the Day of Giving Committee, and Advancement Services. Day of Giving 2022 was a great success due to their combined efforts!
 - * 1,056 donors united to contribute over \$319K by the official end of Day of Giving (with more still coming in!). Thank you!
 - * The team exceeded the goal for number of gifts by 17% and the total amount received was up 4% over 2021 giving.
 - * Advancement Services set an ETSU record by accurately processing 658 gifts in one day!

Annual Giving

- ♦ Day of Giving 2022 succeeded in bringing greater attention to ETSU and the ETSU Foundation.
 - ◆ Exceeded our goal of 900 donors by achieving 1,056 during Day of Giving (21% above last year).
 - Received over \$319K in gifts and pledges during Day of Giving (\$12K more than last year).
 - We solicited from students for the first time this year, resulting in more than 118 gifts.
 - Received no (as in zero) negative feedback on social media, in email, or via hard-copy mail!

Alumni Association

- We welcomed the return of our "Graduation Celebration: Real World 101" on March 8th. This event, traditionally held each semester, is an opportunity for students who have earned at least 60 academic hours, to visit with campus organizations and community vendors, to receive tools to prepare for graduation and life thereafter. We are excited to welcome over 2,000 new Alumni to our Alumni Association during the May Commencement.
- At the end of February, we launched our new Alumni Ambassador Program. Ambassadors receive an exclusive swag item, invitations to Ambassador-only quarterly events and a number of other incentives. 92 Alumni have already joined the program since its launch!


Planned Giving

Athletics

- The ETSU Men's Tennis team won their 4th consecutive Southern Conference Championship on April 23, 2022.
- The ETSU Men's Golf team won the Southern Conference Championship on April 24, 2022. This is a back-to-back championship, as the Bucs also won in 2021. Remi Chartier was the individual SoCon Champion.
- ETSU Athletics received approximately 200 gifts, totaling over \$40,000, during ETSU Day of Giving.

Student Life & Enrollment

- Disability Services established an Accessibility and Assistive Technology Lab in the newly renovated D.P. Culp Center. It is available to students registered with Disability Services and provides a quiet study space for students while offering a variety of specialized software and tools.
- Bucky's Food Pantry opened a new site on campus in the DP Culp Center. The site was brought about through a partnership with Student Life and Enrollment, AmeriCorps, and Sodexo, with all three entities striving to bring a sustainable model of food provision to campus to address the needs of our students. In placing the site at the DP Culp Center, we also sought to destignatize the use of the food pantry.
- During Spring Break, ETSU students participated in the student-led and developed Alternative Breaks program. Four teams traveled to New Orleans, Louisiana (Education and Youth Development); Nashville (Healthcare Access for Underserved Populations; Memphis (Food Security and Sustainability); and Rural Kentucky (Alcohol and Substance Abuse). We are so thankful for our students' time and commitment to social justice and cannot wait to see the impact these experiences have on their lives and the lives of others.
- ETSU was recognized with the Military Friendly School designation for the 12th year in a row this spring and is continuing to build toward a goal of having 1,000 Military Affiliated Students on campus or pursuing a degree from ETSU online.

University Programs

- The Sherrod Library continues its work to keep education affordable by investing in the Open and Affordable Course Materials Initiative and the E-Textbook Reserve Program to keep instructional materials free to everyone. Since the beginning of these programs in 2018, the ETSU student community has saved \$800,000 on the cost of their textbooks.
- The College of Graduate and Continuing Studies focuses on adult student learning, including workforce development, transfer students, and graduate students. There are more than 2,400 graduate students enrolled this academic year and there are more than 16,000 alumni of ETSU graduate programs.
- The first cohort of the Honors Early Assurance Program was just selected. This is a partnership between the Honors College and Quillen College of Medicine that provides guaranteed admission to the Quillen College of Medicine for 5 students each year who complete the program requirements.

WETS-FM

- The WETS-FM Spring Fundraiser was from April 2—April 9, and was a huge success!
- The station received gifts and pledges of more than \$100,000.
