The Clery Act & Your Role as a Campus Security Authority (CSA)

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act) is a federal mandate requiring all institutions of higher education (IHEs) that participate in the federal student financial aid program to disclose information about crime on their campuses and in the surrounding communities. As an advisor you are designated under the Clery Act to be a Campus Security Authority (CSA), and as such, are an important link in a system that helps ETSU keep accurate campus crime statistics.

As a CSA, you are required to report knowledge of crimes/suspected crimes that occur on campus, campus affiliated property, or at campus-related activities/events.

Weapon Violation (possession, brandishing)
Alcohol Violation (underage possession)

The importance of including student organization advisors as CSAs recognizes that many students are hesitant to report crimes to campus police, but may be more inclined to report incidents to other campus affiliated individuals instead.

Without accurate statistics, crime awareness, prevention, and response programs cannot be targeted appropriately. This decreases the climate of security for our entire community.

Remember, it not your responsibility to investigate alleged campus crimes, just to report them. If you are in doubt as to whether a reportable crime has occurred, please err on the side of caution and report it.
